Introducing Mei Leong - Transport Project Coordinator



We have long been concerned about the limited transport provisions in our community, especially for those who don't

Kia Ora! I've recently taken on the role of Project Coordinator for Accessible Transport Solutions, and really appreciate this opportunity to be a part of the Eastern Bay Villages Te Kokoru Manaakitanga whānau. It is a privilege to be involved with community groups in the Bay – I've previously worked over a decade with Coastcare, supporting community conservation efforts, and had several years with Pou Whakaaro. Born and raised (mostly) in the Bay of Plenty, I have also spent time living in the UK and Asia, and place a high value on the inclusion of all cultures and people within Aotearoa. My personal interests and hobbies include nature & bush-walking, arts & crafts, and history (Whakatāne Historical Society committee member). I'm very excited to take on this new project, and see much value in finding community transport solutions for the benefit of our community.

drive anymore. This is a major cause of vulnerability and isolation, both for seniors and for younger people with disabilities. Long term solutions are needed to ensure accessible and affordable transport is available to everyone, no matter where they live.

This year we received Lottery funding to solve some of the transport issues people face. We began establishing a reference group of people with lived experience of issues faced by those who do not drive. They named our project: **Accessible Transport Solutions.** Then both the Whakatāne District Council and the Bay of Plenty Regional Council, with all their expertise, came on board as advisers and contributed to funding the initial research. Joe Metcalfe who supports the Councils' transport work, says this is about "Councils supporting communities to support themselves'.

Many towns now have charitable trusts that own vehicles and coordinate volunteer drivers. That might be one solution. For rural dwellers we may need an app, connecting those travelling with those who need a lift. Other ideas will come to light as we discuss this with other interested people and groups. Mei Leong, is researching needs and collating information on resources available and solutions working elsewhere. The more ideas, time and energy we can bring to this project the more successful it will be. What is homeshare?

Homesharing connects two people who can mutually benefit from living together. It provides companionship, friendship, kindness and a safe home for both parties to enjoy life.

The practice is born out of the desire of older people to have the companionship and support they need to stay at home while they age. In exchange for free board, a homesharer will provide about 10 hours support a week. Householders also benefit from the additional safety of having someone there at night.

The support homesharers provide depends on the householders' needs. It could range from driving them to appointments, cleaning, making dinner, caring for pets, going for walks together and gardening. Homesharers do not provide personal care (showering etc) as that is provided by homecare services.

Support Net provide carer support days so, if the homesharer goes on holiday or is ill, then someone else is paid to stay over. We arrange for one of our members to provide that

NETSAFE'S GUIDE TO SCAM SPOTTING

An online scam is any scheme designed to trick people out of money or steal their personal information that uses, or is delivered via, digital communications. Here are a few tell-tale signs you might be being scammed:

- **Contact that is out of the blue** even if the person says they're from a legitimate organisation like the bank, an embassy or your internet provider
- **Getting told there's a problem with your phone, laptop or internet connections** often they will offer to fix your device or say they are from your phone or internet company
- **Being asked for passwords** legitimate organisations will never ask for the passwords to your online accounts
- **Needing to verify your account or details** don't respond or click on any links in the communication even if it looks like it's from a real organisation
- Trying to get you to move outside of an online trading or booking website or app (like Air BnB) don't pay outside of the normal website or app processes
- Offering money or a prize in exchange for something up front they might say that it's
 a "processing" fee or something similar
- Being asked for money by friends/partners you've met online this is a very common tactic, do not pay the money
- Unusual ways to pay for something scammers try to use payments that can't be traced such as pre-loaded debit cards, gift cards, bitcoins, iTunes cards or money transfer systems
- Asking for remote access to your device never do this unless you have actively sought out the service they are providing
- **Pressuring you to make a decision quickly** this could be to avoid something bad (e.g. account being closed, trouble with the IRD) or to take advantage of something good (a deal or investment)

Banks , Immigration New Zealand or Inland Revenue <u>NEVER</u> email, call or text customers to ask for personal information.

If you receive a request like that <u>IT IS A SCAM</u>

A new email scam impersonating the NZTA is being sent around telling vehicle owners their licenses are due.

The email directs the recipient to renew the funds through clicking a 'Renew Now' button at the bottom corner of the email. It then takes the individual to fake website that gets them to fill in personal details.

CERT NZ, the government authority responsible for cyber security said in a tweet, that anyone who receives this email should report it directly to Waka Kotahi (NZTA).

How to spot a phishing scam:

- NZTA will only send an email through if an individual has contacted them first.
- Email addresses will always end in @nzta.govt.nz, @enews.nzta.govt.nz or @reply.nzta.govt.nz.
- The email may be missing specific details that the NZTA will have on file: such as your plate number, the date your vehicle license is due and vehicle make and model.
- Hover over buttons and links to see if the pop-up will take you to a genuine government (.govt.nz) website
